- 2. Plan your frame design. Do you want to layer pieces of tissue paper on the frame or "crunch up" tissue into pieces or a combination of both? See photo for reference.
- 3. Use your fingers to tear, crunch and layer the tissue paper as you want on the frame. Press the paper lightly so it sticks to the frame. Cover your whole frame so that no white is showing.
- 4. Select a picture that you want to use (either 3 x 5" or 4 x 6" works). Peel off the paper on the picture frame back and lay on work surface with sticky side up. Take your picture and position it on the back of the frame front. You can use a small piece of tape (optional) to secure it to the back of the frame front. Make sure the photo shows through the frame!
- 5. Carefully lay down the frame front with photo in position on the frame back. Press down to secure it.
