Owl Windsock Craft Kit (Pk/28)

PLEASE READ ALL INSTRUCTIONS BEFORE STARTING



YOUR KIT CONTAINS:

- Assorted Paper Bags
- Assorted Tissue Strips
- Kite String
- Markers
- Glue

YOU WILL NEED:

- Scissors
- A Sharp Pencil
- Clear Tape (optional)

AGE GROUP: 7 and up

PROJECT TIME: 30 minutes


EACH PERSON SHOULD HAVE:

- 1 Paper bag
- 15 Tissue paper strips
- 12 Inches of kite string

The markers and glue will be shared among the group.

INSTRUCTIONS:

- 1. One side of your paper bag has a longer bottom edge. This is the back side of the bag.
- 2. With the back of the bag facing up, fold the back in half lengthwise, lining up the outside edges, see dotted line in Figure A.
- 3. With the backside of the bag still facing up, open the bag slightly and cut the back of the bag about halfway up the vertical fold. Cut a "T" shape following the line in Figure B.
- 4. With the front side of the bag facing up, put your hand inside the top half of the bag and carefully push the top middle point down with your fingers in the corners, bring the corner points together in the center to create fold lines on either side. See dotted lines in Figure C.
- 5. Flatten the bag back out with the back facing up, fold the top corners of the owl's wings down. Follow dotted line in Figure D.
- 6. Flip the bag over so the front side is up. Use the markers to draw bold eyes and a beak creating your owl's face however you wish. See Figure E.
- 7. Using the markers, draw waves of small feathers from the bottom of your owl face down to the bottom edge or opening of your bag. See finished image.
- 8. Glue the tissue strips to the wings and allow to dry.
- 9. Tie the kite string into a small loop by knotting the two loose ends together. Use a pencil or a small hole punch to make a center hole in the top of the owl's head. Tape or glue the knotted end of the kite string loop to the inside of the bag, feeding it through the center hole you just created, to make a hanger.





Owls are a type of bird known as a raptor. Raptors include other birds, such as Eagles, Falcons, Osprey, Hawks, and Vultures to name a few. A raptor is a bird that feeds on meat from hunting. It usually has large talons or claws to kill and carry its prey. The word raptor comes from the Latin, *rapere*, meaning to seize and sweep away. Raptors also have very sharp vision and strong beaks. Owls have longer and sharper talons than most raptors, to pierce their prey more easily. They make no sounds when they fly, due to the serrated edges of their soft feathers. They aren't as fast as some other birds, but they are silent.
