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Stitched Felt Heart Craft Kit (Pk/12)

YOUR KIT CONTAINS:

- Felt Heart Shapes
- Felt Strip for hanging
- Embroidery Floss
- Plastic Needle
- Ribbon
- Pack of Polyfill Stuffing

NOTE: Each project is
packed individually for
your convenience!

YOU WILL NEED:

- Scissors

AGE GROUP: 8 and up
PROJECT TIME: 45 minutes

INSTRUCTIONS:

TIP: Refer to finished photo as needed.

1. Thread the needle with the red floss making sure that you only knot 1 end of the floss (the other end will be loose). (See Figure 1).

**START BY STITCHING TOGETHER
THE PIECES FOR THE FRONT OF THE HEART:**

2. Take the smallest red heart and lay it over white heart, lining up the holes lay this over the large heart with similar holes. Stitch through the 2 center holes (through all 3 layers). Tie a knot in back when finished and cut floss/needle off. Tie a new knot at the end of your floss (similar to step 1) and stitch through the white and larger red heart layers. Tie a knot in back when finished and cut floss/needle off. (See Figure 2).

STITCHING THE HEART TOGETHER:

3. Change the floss in your needle to white. Knot the end as in Step 1.
4. Lay the 2 large red hearts over each other, lining up the holes. Starting at the top left of the heart, begin stitching around until you get to the top right of the heart following an over-under-over pattern. Stop stitching and stuff the heart with stuffing (you will have stuffing left over). Continue stitching until you get to the center of the heart. (See Figure 3).
5. Take the folded felt strip and stitch that into the inside of the center of the heart as you continue stitching. When you reach the spot where you started, tie a knot in the floss making sure knot is the back. Cut off floss/needle. (See Figure 4).
6. Take the 2 ribbons and tie them together in a bow around the base of the felt hanger. (See Figure 5).

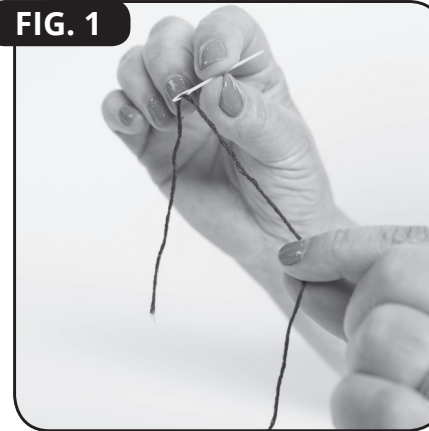

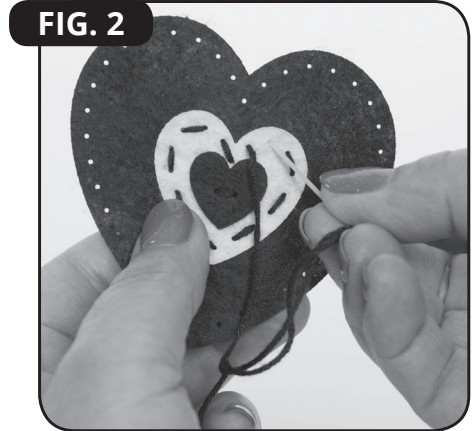

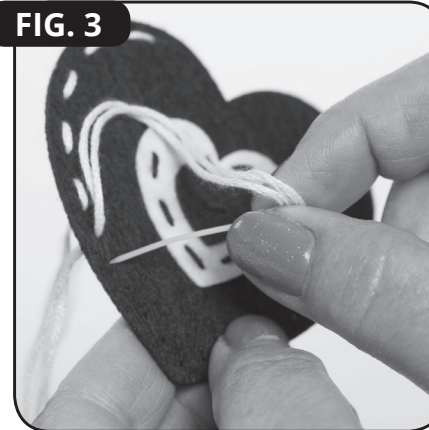

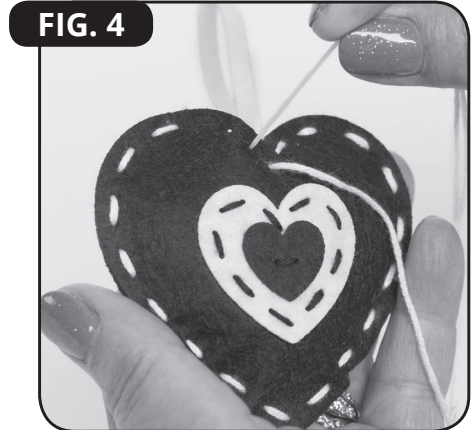
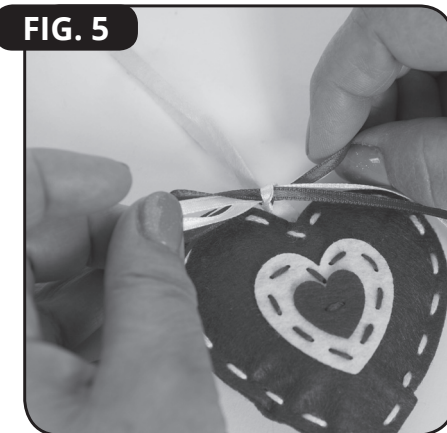
